Party Room

Creating a balance of yin and yang energies as expressed in Feng Shui design can create more harmony within a space, which in turn makes the people within the space feel good. Yin expresses the feminine with soft, round, curvy lines, and dark colors that create calmness.

Yang expresses the masculine with sharp angles and bold color, which creates
